
Simple Rules for Successful Engagement






Brain Scan: Effects of Toxic Stress




The 5 R's of Healthy Brain Development



- 1. Relationships
- 2. Responsive interactions
- 3. Respect
- 4. Routines
- 5. Repetition

Relationships



Warm, loving, secure attachment relationships give children the foundation they need for healthy development.

Responsive Interactions



- Caregiver follows the child's lead.
- Sensitive, backand-forth interactions.
- Adult tunes in to the child.

Serve and Return

Respect



- Treating all children as valuable individuals.
- Teach and guide, not punish and shame.
- Empathy.
- Understand misbehavior.
- Provide understanding and support.

Routines



- Safety and security.
- Calms bottom functions.
- Allows top functions.

Repetition





Set realistic expectations based on brain development.



Be aware that the experiences we provide are building brain architecture.



Provide positive relationships and supportive, enriching environments.

Understand the importance of being an asset to the classroom.
