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How do you get youth a job after high school?

- Lack of linkages with other agency resources


Project Search

... Medicaid Waivers



WHEN CERTAIN MEDICAID RULES ARE WAIVED, A STATE CAN IDENTIFY . . .

- A specific target population to be served
- Number of people to be served
- Services provided



WAIVER SERVICES

- Finite number of people served (slots)
- If all waiver slots are filled, the State is permitted to have a waiting list
- Medical and financial eligibility requirements





Integration and access to the community



Integration and access to the community means that you have the same chances to be an active and included member of your neighborhood and community as someone without disabilities.

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Choice

Choice means that you can select the services and supports that you need, who provides them, and where you receive them.







Social Security Administration (SSA) Work Supports

For SSI and SSDI beneficiaries

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Cash assistance to aged, blind, and disabled persons (including children) who have limited income and resources.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

Must meet Social Security's disability criteria. Must have limited income and resources.

Medicaid Health Coverage

2022 -Monthly Max Federal SSI Amount

\$841 for an eligible individual

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Student Earned Income Exclusion (SSI ONLY)

For students under the age of 22 receiving SSI who are regularly attending school, Social Security does not count a certain amount of earned income per month when calculating a beneficiary's monthly SSI payment amount.

For 2022, the SEIE amounts are \$2,040 per month and not more than \$8,230 for the year.

T/F: You will lose access to Medicaid if you start working.

FALSE! After you start working, your Medicaid coverage can continue, even if your earnings (alone or in combination with your other income) become too high to receive SSI.

Under the **Continued Medicaid Eligibility Work Incentive** (Section 1619(B)), you may qualify for continued Medicaid coverage when your SSI payments stop.

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T/F: If you are fully employed and off Social Security benefits, you can never get back on Social Security.

FALSE! An **Expedited Reinstatement Review** can get your benefits restarted without having to complete a new application. While SSA determines your reinstatement, you are eligible to receive temporary benefits for up to 6 months.

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Section 301: Are you...

Participating in an appropriate program of vocational rehabilitation?

Key question for SSA -- Will your participation in the program increase the likelihood of you becoming employed and therefore able to move off SSI?

What is an Appropriate Program of Vocational Rehabilitation?

Examples:

- IEP for student 18-21 yo
- Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE) from VR

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How Long Will My Benefits Continue Under Section 301?

- You complete or stop your program
- SSA determines that your continued participation is not likely to increase the chance of your being removed from SSA benefits

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
